"Civil Judicial Co-operation Post-Brexit"

Mark Sweeney is Director General for Justice Policy, Strategy and Communications at the Ministry of Justice. The group is responsible for policy on courts and tribunal systems; EU and international policy (including the implications of the UK's exit from the European Union), and the Lord Chancellor's relationship with, and policy on, the judiciary and the legal sector. Mr Sweeney is also responsible for strategy and communications for the Department, including supporting Ministers and the wider Department through the private offices and Parliamentary team. He has previously held a number of key roles, including Constitution Director at the Cabinet Office responsible for policy on elections and referendums, the UK's constitutional settlement and devolution; Director for Law, Rights and International at the Ministry of Justice; and Principal Private Secretary to Ken Clarke as Lord Chancellor and Secretary of State for Justice.
