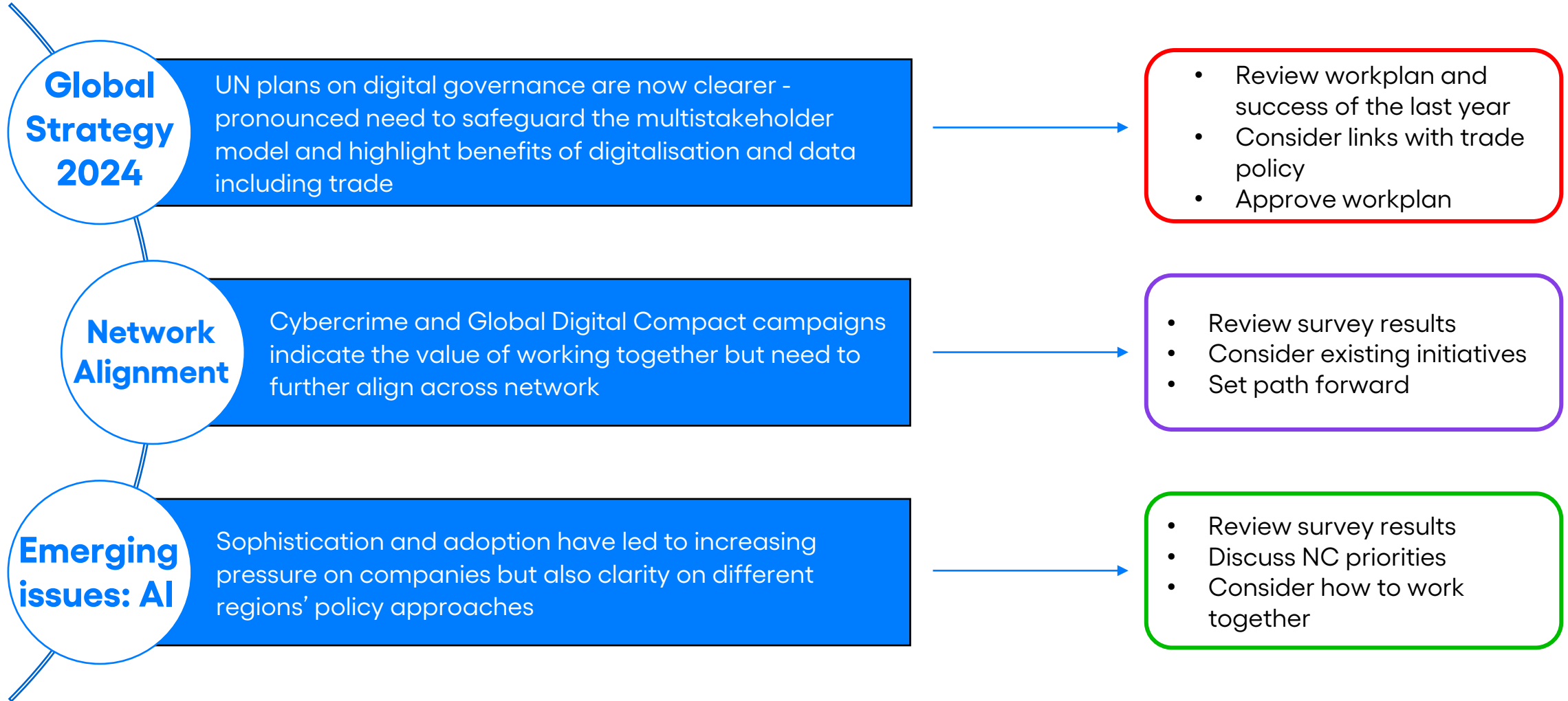

National Committee Engagement Overview

The ICC Global Digital Economy Commission Secretariat ran a survey to source **information** and **feedback** on the **level of engagement** and **strategic priorities** of National Committees with the Commission. Ten (10) NCs participated in the survey from the Asia-Pacific (China, Indonesia, Philippines, Thailand), Western Asia (Armenia), Africa (Morocco) and Americas (USA, Ecuador, Canada, Colombia) Regions.

Overview of results

Engagement

50% NCs said they follow and engage with the biannual Commission meetings, international advocacy campaigns and domestic digital policy issues. **20%** participate in specific projects.

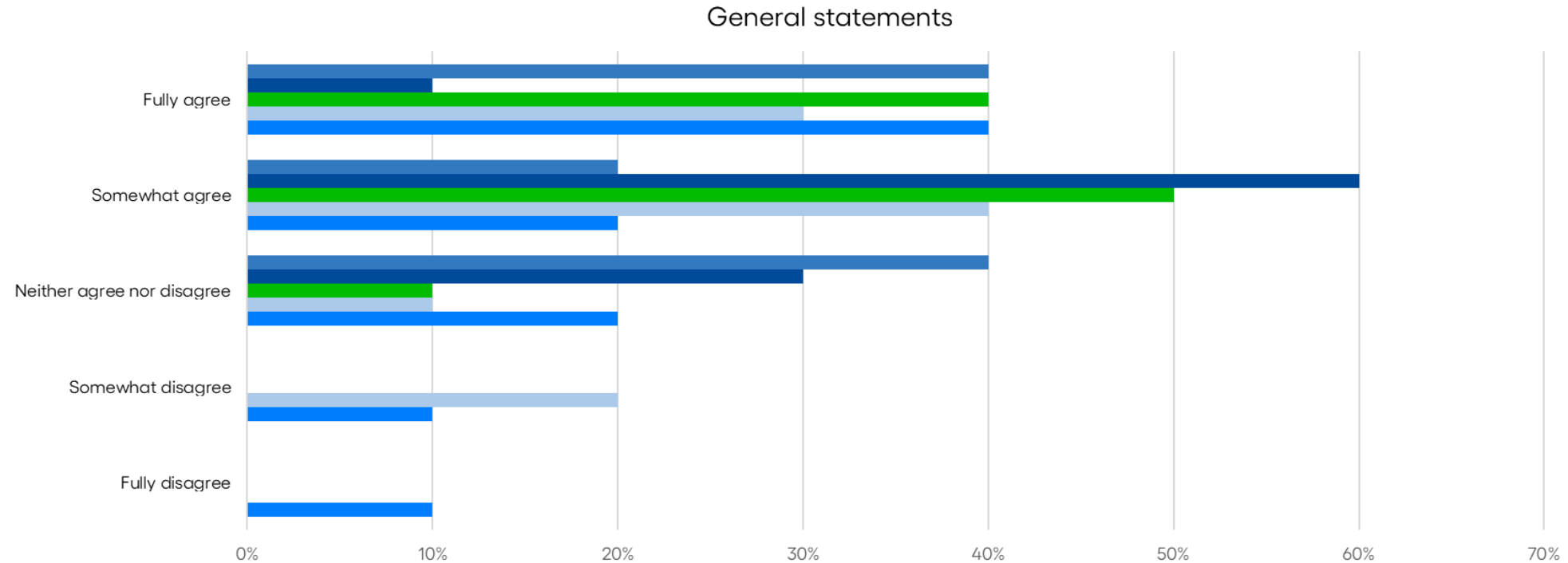
Communications

NCs prefer to receive communications by **Working Group mailing lists (90%)**, followed by **Quarterly newsletters and Topical webinars (80%)**, and **Calls with the Secretariat (40%)**.

Topics of interest

NCs have shown a clear interest in **Cybersecurity (70%)**, followed by **AI (50%)**, **Connectivity & Access and Data Governance (40%)**.

National Committee Engagement Survey Results



■ The Commission works on the right digital policy issues (40% Neither agree nor disagree and 40% Fully agree)

■ The Commission's work is relevant for domestic digital policy discussions in my country (60% Somewhat agree)

■ The Commission's work is relevant for international digital policy discussions (50% Somewhat agree)

■ I have the necessary channels to provide input to shape the work of the Commission (40% Somewhat agree)

■ I have clarity on the current workstreams and projects of the Commission (40% Fully agree)

Trade and the Digital Economy Digital Trade Context

Moratorium on Customs duties on electronic transmissions (multilateral)



Since 1998, WTO members have agreed every few years not to impose customs duties on electronic transmissions



With the growth of digital trade, there is an intensifying debate around the Moratorium, with certain WTO members primarily concerned with a **potential loss in customs revenue**, even if recent OECD/IMF reports show VAT/GST more efficient than duties and offset any potential revenue losses

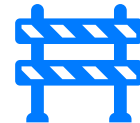


The Moratorium is set to lapse at the 13th WTO Ministerial Conference in February 2024 unless WTO members agree to renew it

Joint Statement Initiative (JSI) on E-commerce (plurilateral discussions with 90 WTO members)



Aim to conclude negotiations in early 2024, including on e-payments, e-signatures, e-contracts, open government data, consumer protection, spam, e-invoicing, telecommunications and information and communication technology products that use cryptography



13 “parked” articles, including on data flows and localization, source code, and privacy



Perspective of developing countries is key in reaching agreement on these topics

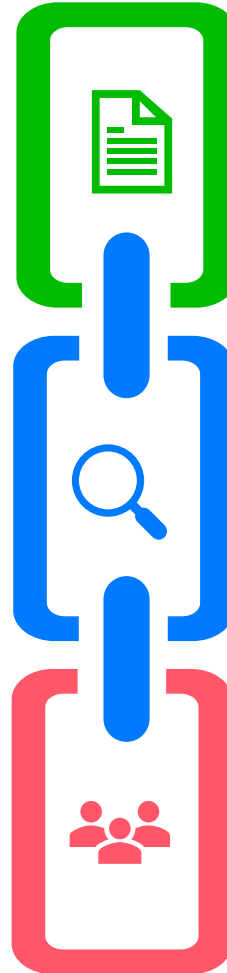

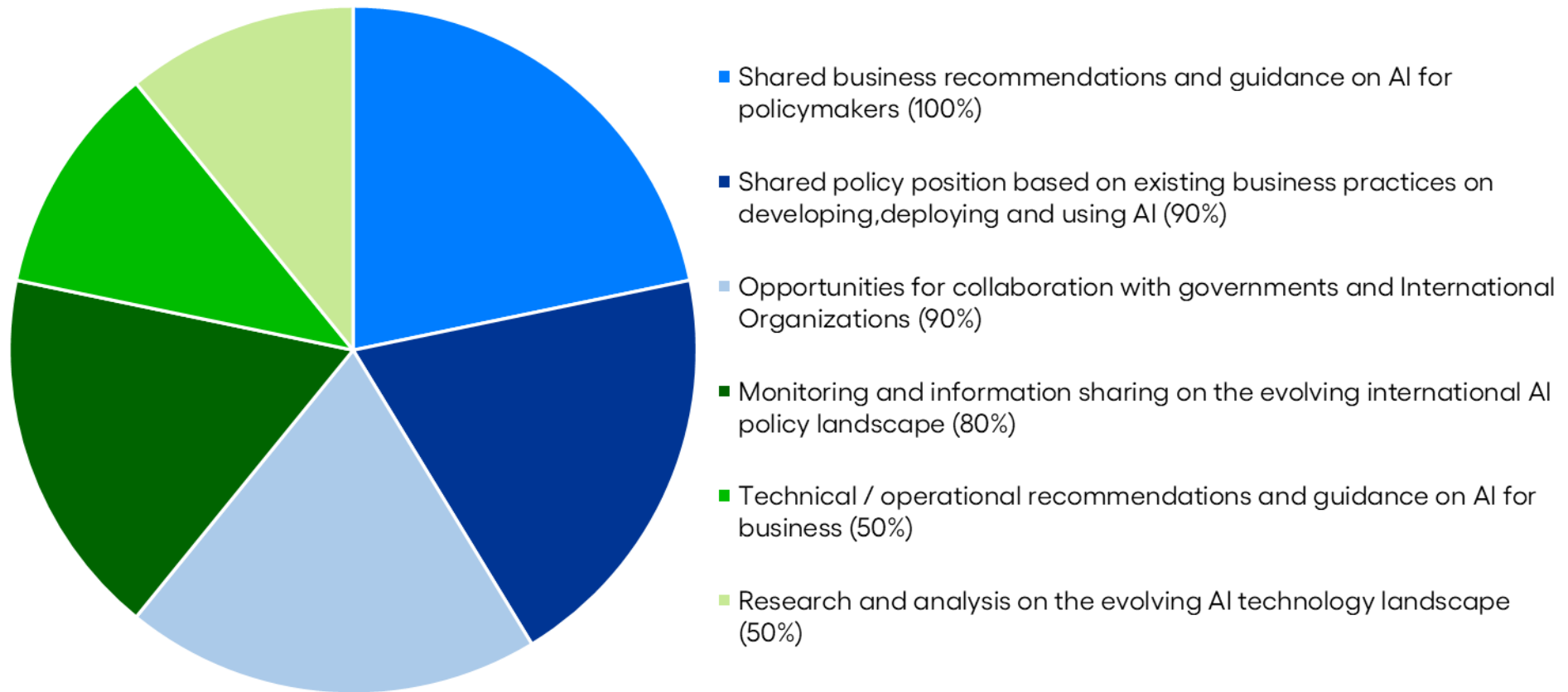

The ICC Global Digital Economy Commission Secretariat ran a survey to understand what kind of **activities** National Committees were already conducting related to artificial intelligence and to establish what they would find the most useful from the Secretariat in future.
